God's Love Does --- A True Love Story

How do you spell love?? Hamburger... Yes, H A M B U R G E R - a greasy, non-descript, flat, bland tasting, grill tossed - after steaming hamburger from the Valparaiso University (Valpo) Student Union Center. Let me back up just a bit. In 1978, I packed up two large suitcases and left everything and everyone I knew in Buffalo, NY for a very good, small private Lutheran university over 1000 miles away. I was to become one of 23 African American students on a campus of over 1500. My first year, I would study hard and yet still make C's instead of the A's I had been used to in high school. After my second semester at Valpo in Engineering, I was summoned into the "advisors" office to talk about whether or not I was a good fit for engineering. I had come to Valpo on an Engineering scholarship so if I was not a good fit for Engineering then, in my mind - I was not a good fit for college at all.

Sadden by this revelation, I left the advisors office stunned feeling hopeless and lost. For some reason, I wandered into the student union building. As I walked around looking for a friendly face, I literally bumped into Dr. Lou Jean Walton. Dr. Lou Jean "Boots" Walton was the Chair of the Social Work department and to my knowledge, the only African American faculty person full time on campus. I'm not sure if she found me or if I found her. All I know is - I was down, struggling mentally, trying to figure out what I was going to do to stay in school – Dr. Lou Jean Walton saw me and did something. She acted quickly and boldly. That afternoon she changed my life and she showed me the love of Christ like never before. She put a form of His agape love into swift action. First, she took me down to the snack bar and bought me the aforementioned burger. Then, she encouraged me strongly not to quit school. Dr. Walton asked me if I had any faith and I said I did. Then she reminded me to keep on praying and to remember that God was with me right here at Valpo. She told me not to ever forget that God did not bring me all the way here to fail. And that He promised in his Word, that He would supply all of my needs. She sounded just like a preacher, but she wasn't. She was much more. That day she felt like an angel. She sat with me for what seemed like an eternity; even though (I would later find out) she had a faculty meeting and children waiting to be picked up 30 miles away. Finally, she gave me a big long hug, her phone number and five dollars.

Why this story? Because, this is one of my best true God stories ever. It is a story about what happens when you "love your neighbor as yourself.". Almost, forty years later and we are still friends. This encounter and many that followed, taught me that God takes time to see us and we must take time in love to see others. It showed me the real agape love of Christ. A love that is deep and wide and long. A love that always involves time, sacrifice and being present. I learned that day that God's love does. It does. It always does something for someone else.


So this Valentine's Day, don't be on the lookout - to get. Try some agape love and be on the spy - to give.

Letter from UMC Council of Bishops

As a Pastor in the United Methodist Church, I am called to respond to issues of social justice. Last month, President Donald Trump allegedly made some disparaging comments about immigrants in the United States. I have attached the response from the Council of Bishops for largest dissemination. I want you to know that I wholeheartedly support the comments and sentiment of the Bishop's letter.



United Methodist bishops condemn President Trump's "offensive" remarks against immigrants. The statement follows:

January 12, 2018

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Bishop Bruce R. Ough, president of the United Methodist Council of Bishops, issued a statement today on behalf of the Council concerning remarks reported to have been made by President Donald Trump regarding immigrants. The statement follows:

We are appalled by the offensive, disgusting words attributed to President Donald Trump who is said to have referred to immigrants from African countries and Haiti, and the countries themselves, in an insulting and derogative manner. According to various media accounts, President Trump made the remarks during a White House discussion with lawmakers on immigration.

As reported, President Trump's words are not only offensive and harmful, they are racist.

We call upon all Christians, especially United Methodists, to condemn this characterization and further call for President Trump to apologize.

As United Methodists, we cherish our brothers and sisters from all parts of the world and we believe that God loves all creation regardless of where they live or where they come from. As leaders of our global United Methodist Church, we are sickened by such uncouth language from the leader of a nation that was founded by immigrants and serves as a beacon to the world's "huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

Thousands of our clergy, laity and other highly skilled, productive citizens are from places President Trump has defamed with his comments. The fact that he also insists the United States should consider more immigrants from Europe and Asia demonstrates the racist character of his comments. This is a direct contradiction of God's love for all people. Further, these comments on the eve of celebrating Martin Luther King Day belies Dr. King's witness and the United States' ongoing battle against racism.

We just celebrated the birth of Jesus Christ, whose parents during his infancy, had to flee to Africa to escape from the wrath of King Herod. Millions of immigrants across the globe are running away from such despicable and life-threatening events. Hence, we have the Christian duty to be supportive of them as they flee political, cultural and social dangers in their native homes.

We will not stand by and allow our brothers and sisters to be maligned in such a crude manner. We call on all United Methodists, all people of faith, and the political leadership of the United States to speak up and speak against such demeaning and racist comments.

Christ reminds us that it is by love that they will know that we are Christians. Let's demonstrate that love for all of God's people by saying no to racism; no to discrimination and no to bigotry.
